Our guest speaker this evening is Mary Tallouzi. Caregiver with the Wounded Tallouzi, Caregiver with the Wounded Warrior Project. Wounded Warrior Project (WWP) began in 2003 as a small, grassroots effort providing simple care and comfort items to the hospital bedsides of the first wounded service members returning home from the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan. As their post-service needs evolved, so have the programs and services. Today, through direct programs in mental health, career counseling, and long-term rehabilitative care, along with our advocacy efforts, WWP



improves the lives of millions of warriors and their families.

Mary was born and raised in Temple, Texas, and relocated to New Mexico in 1990. She raised three children, Christopher, Daniel, and Jennifer, mostly as a single parent. Christopher and Daniel proudly served their country in the United States Army, and both were deployed to Iraq.

It was during this time that Mary's life changed. She says she will never forget the feeling in her heart when she asked herself: "What do I do now? How do I define my life?

Those questions arose in September 2006, when her son, U.S. Army Staff Sergeant Daniel Tallouzi, was wounded from a mortar attack in Iraq. Shrapnel the size of a quarter crossed both hemispheres of Daniel's brain and lodged in the center. He endured more than two years in hospitals before returning home. Daniel passed away on February 28, 2009.

Mary served as Daniel's caregiver, a 24-hour-a-day job she performed with great love. "Life stops for the advocate," says Mary. "As a caregiver, I experienced the loss of a son and a profound change of life. The military has been a part of our family since the Korean War. I'm proud of Daniel's admiration for our family legacy, and we're honored that he now walks among the eternal warriors who paid the ultimate sacrifice for freedom."

It was during Mary's time as Daniel's caregiver when she first became connected with Wounded Warrior Project® (WWP). "I met WWP in October 2006 when Daniel transitioned to Walter Reed Army Medical Center. Members of WWP entered the room and without missing a beat, they addressed Daniel first. The rest of the world had become accustomed to speaking to his mother since Daniel was in a coma. They thanked him for his service. They presented him with a backpack - the message of waking up and moving forward. They let me know I would not be alone.

Because of her experiences with Daniel, Mary supports the WWP mission as a spokesperson and has become a member of the National Speaker's Association, advocating for injured service members and caregivers across the nation. We were pleased to welcome back M.E. Martinez, a member of the Alamo Heights Rotary Club, as our guest speaker on September 5th. M.E. is the Chair with Ride for Reading San Antonio, a 501(c)(3) non-profit charity that donates books to children from low-income areas and hosts fundraising events to promote literacy, as well as educating children about bicycling. In addition to donations of books, the organization has raised money to purchase books to be donated to children. In the past 3 years they have delivered over 27,000 books to children in low-income areas. Books are typically delivered by bicycle riders at school events.





The need for books is great as it is important to learn to read early and most of the young in low- income families have no books or only 1-2 books available to them. In San Antonio, 20% of the residents only read at the 5th Grade level. The children are expected to pledge to read as

part of receiving their books. The organization is looking to expand their programs to increase the amount of books distributed, to add a bilingual book program, and other activities.

Several club members and guests in attendance brought books to our meeting to donate to Ride for Reading San Antonio. Club president Dan Clark presented an illustrated Miriam-Webster's dictionary to M.E. on behalf of the San Antonio Northeast Rotary Club. Thank you, M.E. for a very passionate presentation.
