Our speakers this evening are Egan Little and Joe Esparza, with the San Antonio Stock Show and Rodeo. Starting in 1949, The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo in San Antonio, Texas, USA has grown to be one of the largest events in the city with more than two million visitors each year. It is one of the Professional Rodeo

top Cowboys Association (PRCA) rodeos in the nation. For 14 consecutive years it was awarded the PRCA Large Indoor Rodeo of the Year and attracts the world's best rodeo



athletes and bucking stock. The event includes worldclass entertainment, family-friendly educational activities and exhibits, a carnival, shopping, as well as horse and livestock shows.

The San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc. was established with the mission "A volunteer organization that emphasizes agriculture and education to develop the youth of Texas". The focus on educating the youth of Texas lead to integrating 4-H and FFA high school students and making educational commitments to support their interest in the agricultural and livestock industry. In 1984, the scholarship program began when fifteen, four-year scholarships totaling \$90,000 to were awarded to students entering Texas colleges in the fall. Since then, the organization has committed more than \$186 million to the youth of Texas through scholarships, grants, endowments, junior livestock auctions, youth western art auction, calf scramble program and show premiums.

Egan was born and raised in San Antonio. He attended both Texas Military Institute (T.M.I.) at the old campus in Alamo Heights, and Alamo Heights High School. Egan then went to Southwest Texas State University. During Desert Storm he joined the US Army.

Three years later he came back to Texas and met the love of my life, Amy. They got married and have two wonderful children, Elizabeth and Matthew. Egan was blessed to work with his grandfather, who passed away two years ago at age 106, and his father at L. C. Vending Company; a company founded by his grandfather over 65 years ago.

## **Past Rotary International President** Clifford L. Dochterman dies

Clifford L. Dochterman, a past Rotary International president and university administrator, died on November 23, 2021. He was 95.

Dochterman, who was known for his lively sense of humor, ready smile, and positive outlook on life, served as RI president in 1992-93. An accomplished public speaker, he was recognized around the world as one of the premier spokespersons for Rotary.



Dochterman retired in 1990 after more than 40 years in higher education administration, including 20 years at the University of California, Berkeley, and almost two decades as executive vice president of the University of the Pacific in Stockton, California, USA.

At the University of the Pacific, Dochterman was instrumental in getting funding for new campus buildings and in establishing the development office and the school's Community Involvement Program, which supports first-generation students. When he retired, his colleagues and friends created an endowment in his name.



Dochterman was active in civic and professional organizations throughout his life. He served as president of the Stockton Chamber of Commerce and chair of the San Joaquin County Parks and Recreation Commission, and he received the George Washington Honor Medal from the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge, a U.S. organization that encourages civic engagement. Dochterman also authored two Rotary-related books: a compilation of columns he originally wrote for his club's bulletin called "The ABCs of Rotary," and "As I Was Saying," a collection of his favorite speeches.

Dochterman, a member of the Rotary Club of Moraga, California, joined Rotary in 1958. In addition to his term as president, he served as RI vice president and as Rotary Foundation trustee and trustee chair. He served on or chaired a number of committees and was chair of the 2001 Council on Legislation.

He was one of the architects of Rotary's Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) program and was recognized for his leadership in creating the PolioPlus program.

Clifford and Mary Elena Dochterman were Rotary Foundation Major Donors and Benefactors. He received The Rotary Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service, Distinguished Service Award, PolioPlus Pioneer Award, and


Service Award for a Polio-Free World.

Dochterman was married to Dorothy Coset from 1954 until her death in 1987. In 1994, he married Mary Elena Washburn, who died in 2013. He is survived by two children, Claudia and Clifford Jr.; two stepdaughters, Elena and Karen; and six grandchildren.

As you probably already know, Kentucky along with five other states were devastated by multiple tornadoes on the night of December 10th, 2021 and the morning of December 11th. Especially hard hit was the city of Mayfield, Kentucky. The tornado reached high-end EF4 intensity as it tore directly through the center of town, resulting in a widespread, catastrophic damage throughout the historic downtown square of Mayfield. Most of the structures in downtown Mayfield we're heavily damaged or destroyed, including multiple large, well-built, multi-story brick buildings that completely collapsed. Only large piles of bricks and lumber remained in the hardest-hit portions of the downtown area, and streets were left buried under debris.

The San Antonio Northeast Rotary Club reached out to the Mayfield Rotary Club to offer assistance. Our club donated \$1,000 to the Mayfield Rotary Club to support their community following the absolute devastation. Numerous other Rotary clubs across the country have donated funds and offered other assistance to help rebuild Mayfield. It is times like these that we must remember Rotary's motto "Service Above Self".

The Rotary Club of San Antonio presents the 2021 Holiday Outdoor Ice Rink located in Travis Park adjacent to the annual Christmas tree. The Rink opened November 19th and will remain open through Monday, January 17th. Destined to become a winter tradition in the Alamo City, more than 50,000 skaters are anticipated to enjoy the rink and the beautiful winter surroundings.



In addition to daily skating hours, the attraction will host themed nights and offer discounts including freeadmission Mondays for military and first responders, a half-off , cheap skate" on Tuesdays and discounted group admissions on Thursdays. Lovebirds can also enjoy "date night" on Wednesdays with live music, and hungry skaters can nosh on snacks from food trucks on Friday evenings.

The rink's \$14 admission includes skate rental, since it's unlikely average San Antonians will be packing their own pair of blades.
