Our speaker this evening is **Dr. Francisco Solis, President of San Antonio College**. **Francisco Solis, J.D., is the 14th president of San Antonio College. He is also a SAC alum, having earned an associate of applied science in mortuary science degree in 1995.**



His tenure at the college began in 1999. Since then, he has served in a variety of teaching and leadership roles. He began as a professor and coordinator in the mortuary science program. Other roles included dean for performance excellence and director of learning assessment and review, where he collaborated closely with college leadership to design and implement the institution's strategic plan.

Notably, Dr. Solis contributed to SAC's accreditation report to the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges and played a significant role in applications that led to major recognition for the college, including the Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence, the Seal of Excelencia, the Carnegie Leadership for Public Purpose Classification and the Malcolm Baldrige National Quality Award.

After serving as interim president from June 2022 to January 2023, he retired from SAC in May 2023. Later, at the request of Alamo Colleges District Chancellor Dr. Mike Flores, Solis came out of retirement in March 2024 to serve as interim president again. The Alamo Colleges Board of Trustees unanimously approved him as the college's 14th president on May 20, 2025.

In addition to his career at San Antonio College, Solis has been president of the American Board of Funeral Service Education, chair of the Texas Education Consortium for Male Students of Color, and president of the San Antonio Chapter of the Texas Association of Chicanos in Higher Education (TACHE). He continues to teach as a faculty lecturer at the University of Texas at San Antonio in the Educational Leadership and Policy Studies Program.

Solis is a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin School of Law, St. Edward's University, San Antonio College, and Central Catholic High School.

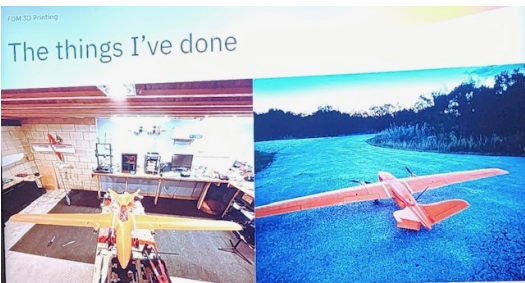

Rotary inaugurates new Peace Center at Symbiosis International University (SIU)

Applications for Rotary’s one-year Postgraduate Diploma Program 2027 at SIU will be open from 1 February -15 May 2026  
PUNE, India (27 Jan. 2026) – In a significant step toward supporting peace and development, the Rotary Peace Center at Symbiosis International University (SIU) was inaugurated on 26 January 2026.

A culmination of the ethos, vision, mission, and expertise of both Rotary International and Symbiosis, the center is situated on Symbiosis’ scenic 400+ acre Lavale campus in Pune. It offers a fully funded one year postgraduate diploma program in Peace and Development Studies. The program has been designed for mid-career professionals working in different sectors of peace and development either within Asia or Asian communities.

“In this interconnected world, peace can no longer be viewed as an abstract ideal; it must be cultivated through institutions that combine knowledge, ethical leadership, and action. Rotary believes that sustainable peace is built when education empowers individuals to serve beyond borders and think beyond divisions,” said Francesco Arezzo, Rotary International President (2025-26). “The establishment of the Rotary Peace Center at Symbiosis International University reflects Rotary’s commitment to nurturing leaders who understand and act with integrity towards a cause. Through this initiative, the center will contribute not only to regional peacebuilding in Asia but to a stronger global framework for shared responsibility,” he added.



For Dr. Vidya Yeravdekar, Principal Director of Symbiosis and the Pro Chancellor of Symbiosis International University, “The establishment of the Rotary Peace Center at Symbiosis International University aligns closely with the core values of Symbiosis and is especially meaningful as it coincides with our 55th anniversary. Founded by Prof. Dr. S. B. Mujumdar, based on the ideal of “Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam”, the mission of Symbiosis was to bring together students from across India and around the world to encourage international understanding and a spirit of brotherhood. Our visionary founder believed that providing quality education was the only way to promote international understanding.”



The Rotary Peace Center at SIU will welcome up to 40 Rotary Peace Fellows each year. “With India’s rich diversity and complex social landscape, the Rotary Peace Center at Symbiosis International University will offer unique opportunities for cultivating leaders who can navigate conflict with empathy and innovation,” said Bharat S. Pandya, Trustee, The Rotary Foundation (2022-2026). “By collaborating with Symbiosis, we are creating a platform where emerging and experienced peacebuilders can gain the knowledge, skills, and networks needed to address local and global challenges. This center will help in nurturing a new generation of leaders in Asia, dedicated to strengthening dialogue, understanding, and sustainable peace,” he added.

“The Rotary Peace Center at SIU will cater to the greater Asia region, integrating an interdisciplinary approach with experiential learning. The one year postgraduate diploma program will be offered in a blended learning format to empower mid-level professionals working in different spheres of peace and development, to advance their engagement in sustainable and actionable outcomes for social change in Asia,” said Dr. Sulakshana Sen, Center Head, Rotary Peace Center at Symbiosis International University.

Rotary currently awards up to 170 fully funded fellowships for dedicated peace and development leaders from around the world to study at one of its eight peace center programs. Since 2002, Rotary Peace Centers have trained more than 1,800 individuals for careers in peacebuilding, and program alumni serve as leaders in governmental and non-governmental agencies, international organizations, and more.

As we have done in the past, with the Big Game taking place this Sunday, we thought we would share with you some information regarding Rotary’s presence in the two cities being represented - Seattle, Washington and Boston, Massachusetts.



There are no less than 12 Rotary clubs that call Seattle home. The first formal gathering of the Rotary Club of Seattle was on June 15, 1909 at the Olympus Café. The Rotary Club of Seattle is more commonly referred to as ‘#4’, because it was the fourth Rotary club chartered, following Chicago, San Francisco and Oakland.

The city of Seattle has hosted two Rotary International Conventions, the first being in 1932, which drew 5,182 attendees. Amidst the Great Depression, the event focused on the role of Rotary in community affairs and international service. Seattle hosted the Rotary International convention for a second time which drew 8,015 attendees. Seattle area Rotary clubs are part of Rotary District 5030.

Whereas Seattle has 12 Rotary clubs, there are seven Rotary clubs in the Boston area. The oldest of the Boston area Rotary clubs is the Boston #7 Rotary Club. Formed in 1909, the Rotary Club of Boston was founded only four years after Rotary’s first club in Chicago, IL. The club was formed before there was an organized “National Association of Rotary Clubs.” Boston Rotary clubs are part of Rotary District 7930.



Boston hosted the Rotary International Convention in 1933, the year after Seattle hosted the convention. The Boston convention drew 8,430 people attendees. This was the first Rotary convention to feature a live radio broadcast that was heard around the world. Rotary founder Paul Harris addressed the audience, stating, “If you have love of ‘men’ in your heart, then you are potential Rotarians”.

While Boston is the largest city closest to the team from Massachusetts playing in the Big Game , the team actually plays in Foxboro. The Foxboro Rotary Club not only donates money, but its members are also strong believers in the power of “sweat equity” - giving people “hands on” assistance. The Foxboro Rotary donates money to many different charities and human service organizations, such as the Rodman Ride for Kids, YMCA Youth Camps, Kennedy Donovan Center, Friends of Wrentham State School, Foxboro Discretionary Fund, Foxboro Senior Center, local athletic clubs as well as providing scholarships to help assist in furthering education. The name of the town is officially spelled *Foxborough*. Foxborough is a town in Norfolk County, Massachusetts, approximately 22 miles southwest of Boston and 18 miles northeast of Providence, Rhode Island. “Foxborough” is the official spelling of the town name, although the alternative spelling “Foxboro” is also frequently used. This alternative spelling is used by the United States Postal Service as the correct form by which to address mail to recipients in the town although both can be processed by their system. The sign on the post office reads “Foxboro.”
